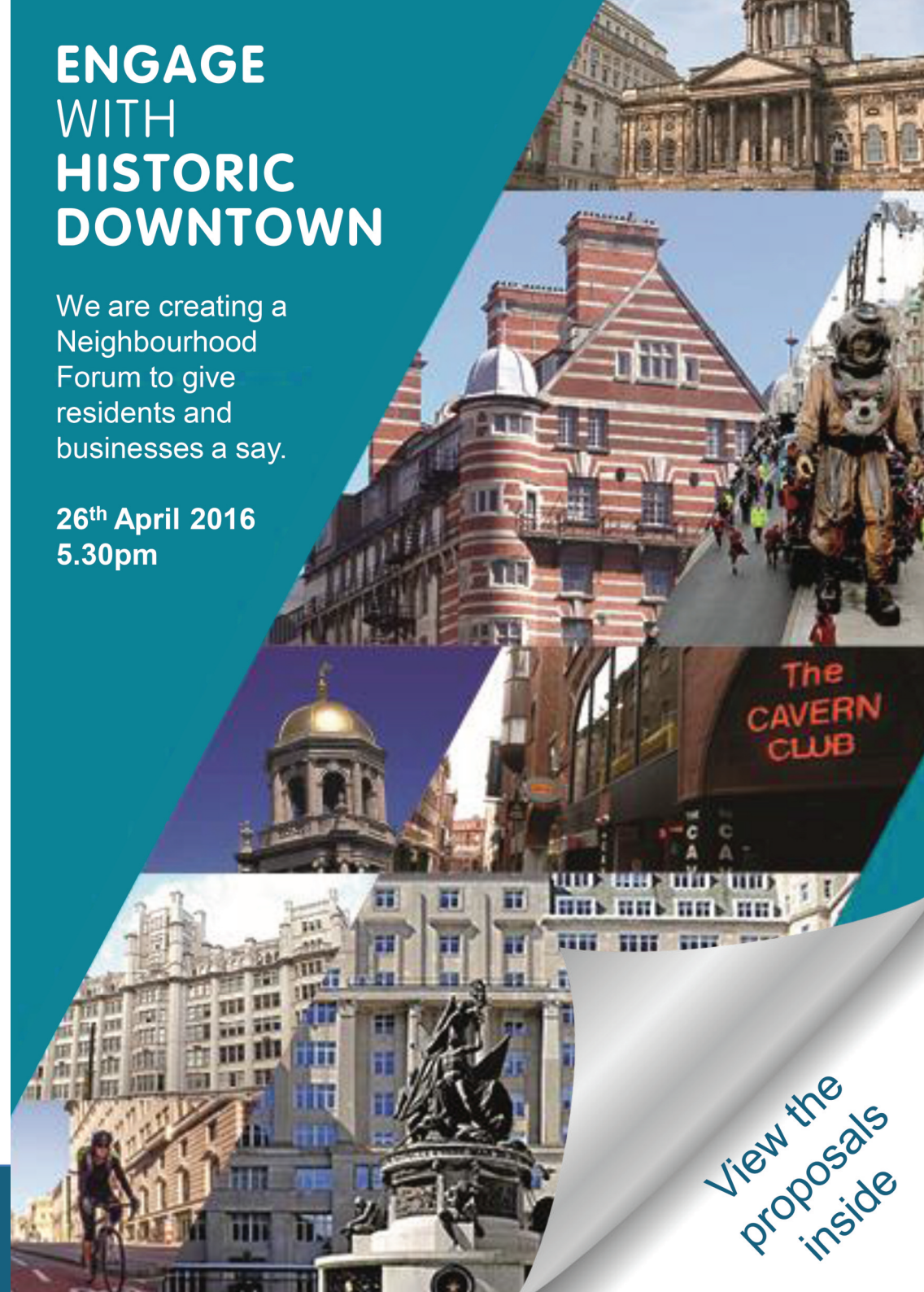

Neighbourhood Plans, created by a Neighbourhood Forum, are a type of planning policy that the Council have to take into account when considering new planning applications in the area.

Whether you are unhappy with how the area around you is developing or just interested in protecting it in the future – you should get involved in the Neighbourhood Plan for Historic Downtown.

During March we met with residents and businesses to start mapping the area and looking at what sort of issues a plan might cover for Historic Downtown (right).

The next step is to see if there is enough interest to create a Neighbourhood Forum – we need a minimum of 21 people who live or work in the area.

This is your opportunity to make a real difference. A plan can be produced in as little as 16 months – during that time, being part of this process, gives residents and businesses a joined up voice, a platform to raise issues, and a way to make projects you are passionate about happen.

The Forum will have support from Engage Liverpool CIC and Urban Vision (UK leaders in Neighbourhood Planning) and other expert agencies.

Predominant Use:
Night Time Economy
Issues for the plan:

- Ensure sensitive residential development to prevent conflict with businesses.
- Zone the night time economy to reduce spread into residential sites.

Predominant Use:
Higher-end residential & leisure.
Issues for the plan:

- Control the spread of student accommodation.
- Limit the opening hours of bars/clubs.
- Ensure new build and refurbishment is of high quality.

Predominant Use:
Student Accommodation
Issues for the plan:

- Control sites for further student accommodation.
- Ensure varied, mixed use development at ground floor level.
